Year 4 visit to St. Peter's Church

As part of their topic work on the history of Thundersley, Year 4 visited St. Peter's Church. Charlie Elliott (Sparrows) and



Mason Major (Bears) give their respective accounts of the visit below:-

"As soon as we walked up to the church we were

acknowledging the old and the new parts of it. Then we went into the actual church and we were greeted by the person who looks after it. He led us into the place where they pray. We talked about facts and asked questions. Then we looked at the materials the Normans used which led us to the bell and the Book of Remembrance. We got divided into two groups and Mrs. Pavitt led my group into the praying room again and we sketched some structures and the leader of the church, the person who looks after it, had the other group and they rang the bell. After that, we went outside onto the grass to sketch the church or some bits outside the church and had our snack. Then we were wandering around the grave yard looking at how the ground was uneven and then the person who looked after the church was telling us that Thundersley was named St. Peters because it was on Lev Road and the God of Thunder, Thaw, was buried at St. Peter's. After that, we looked at Jesus on the stained glass and we were also looking at the paintings of the church when it was in Victorian times. The 1966 extension really makes it look different. I learnt that Mary, the Queen at that time, burnt people if they didn't go to Catholic Church and Robert Drake got burnt. He was the vicar of Thundersley. Harry and I were looking at what to sketch and we asked what the materials were made of and some of the stuff that looked like silver was aluminium and pewter. I thought the visit was a good visit because we got to learn a lot of stuff about how the Kings and Queens nowadays became what they are. The best thing was ringing the bell because we had to give it a lot of



classrooms. At the end we had another

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energy and all three bells gave a different tune." (Charlie Elliott)

"When we were at the church, we went into the old bit of the church and the man asked us what can see. I saw a stained glass window. It looked like people were praying to Jesus. Then we went into the newer bit of the church and we got to sketch some pictures of what we could see. I sketched a big cross. We rang the bell and it was really hard to pull it because of the weight of the bell. When other children rang the bell it sounded like speakers coming through the wall as it was so loud.
