'Let Girls Play' Campaign



On Thursday, Years 1, 2 and 3 participated in the 'Let Girls Play' campaign with Miss Turner-Powell. The girls were joined by

girls from Kingston and everyone had a super time. Marlee Morris (Robins) gives her account of the session below:-

"We were playing football and we were playing games and one of the games was where someone was in the goal and we had to see if we could kick the ball in. We went to the cones and we did dribbling the ball along and when we got to a cone we had to tap the ball with our foot. We had to sit on our ball to listen, then bounce it once and sit behind it to listen for the next activity. We bounced our ball around and when we got to a cone we had to put it on top for 5 counts and then bounce it again. We also did a little bit of passing the ball to each other. The Kingston girls did the same as us and then we had to partner with one of them. We threw the ball to each other. I thought it was really good when we did all the games and partnered up. I play football at the park sometimes and I enjoy that."







Year 4 Residential to Danbury

Also, on Thursday, the Year 4 children went on their first residential (one night) to Danbury. The children were very excited about their trip and, whilst some were a bit apprehensive about staying away from home for the first time, everyone had the best time! Joshua Sandford (Sparrows) describes his trip below:-

"Some people went on the minibus and some went on the coach. Most people were really excited as it was their first residential. When we got there we had to put our stuff away and most rooms had bunk beds. I went on the top bunk which

was good fun. We had to find out which group we were in and had to do the first two activities of the day. The first one I did was bush craft. We had to get wood and then we gave it to the man and he made a fire and then we got a flint and steel and we had to make our own fire. Me and my partner did it after two times but we didn't get a proper fire as it kept going out. I thought it was fun as we got to do it ourselves and watch a man do it properly.

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My second activity was an obstacle course. The first thing we had to do was crawl through a muddy tunnel and then we had to go through netting. It was easy as we could pull it over us. Then we did two tubes. One had a rope in and the other didn't. I did the one without the rope as it was a little bit easier as the one with the rope you could get a rope burn. After that there was a wall of tyres and we had to start at the bottom and climb to the top and then down again in a triangle shape. There was a wooden wall and we had to run and spring up over it or we could get a boost up from a friend. I thought the obstacle course was fairly easy but some didn't as they had wellies on! After that we went back to our cabins and had dinner which was Chinese chicken balls, rice and

















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sweet and sour sauce which was really nice and not dry. After dinner we got to chill in our cabins for about an hour and a half and then we got dressed in our pyjamas and went to sleep. I slept like I would at home as the bed was really comfy and had two mattresses. The next day we woke up and we went to breakfast. For breakfast we had a bacon roll, toast, a brioche bun, some cereal if we wanted it and a drink of water or juice. Then we had to line up outside and go to our next activity which was the zip wire. It was 13.4m in the air and we had to wear a harness which clipped us to the actual zip line. We went down the diagonal one. Jack waited at the bottom to unclip us and the man at the top was called Harry. We did it 3 times. I was nervous and excited at the same time as I had never done it before and I was the second one to go down. I would like to do it again because it wasn't as scary as I thought it would be. After the zip line we went to the low ropes. At the low ropes we had to wear helmets so that we didn't hurt our heads if we fell as that is the most precious part of our body as that is where all our knowledge is. On the first rope we had to hold hands and walk across but if one person fell off we had to start again. I got to do it twice as there was an odd number. After that we came back to

our cabins for about half an hour and then had our lunch. We had a Danbury 'MacDonald's' where we had a choice of a beef burger or a chicken burger. I chose a chicken burger and chips with sauce. We had a chocolate or jam doughnut after. After lunch we had to pack and then get our luggage onto the deck or in the tent. Then we went back on the coach as it was better than the minibus. I thought the whole trip was really good as it had really fun stuff there and it was very exciting spending the night away from home as not many of us had done that apart from sleeping at our nans. I would really like to go there again as all the activities were new and the ones that my group did we all had really good fun and we all said thank you to the men after we had done them."
